**UCB 100**        **"Plastic: Impacts on Your Health, Marine Life and the Environment"**

Description: Suzanne Frazer (B.E.A.C.H.) will discuss the different types of plastics, the impact of marine debris on marine life and making lifestyle changes that are beneficial for your health, marine life and the environment. Suzanne Frazer founded B.E.A.C.H. with Dean Otsuki in 2006. They received the 2008 Living Reef Award which honors groups and individuals that go above and beyond in their actions to make a difference in preserving the reefs. Beach Environmental Awareness Campaign Hawai‘i is an all volunteer, non-profit organization that raises awareness of the impact of marine debris through environmental education, marine debris beach clean-ups as well as plastic reduction and litter prevention campaign.

Description: This presentation will share how DLNR is responsible for the majority of lands within the State of Hawai‘i. DLNR has jurisdiction over watersheds, forest reserves, state parks and historic sites, natural area reserves and public lands, waters, aquatic resources and other resources. There are rules and regulations governing the use of each division of land. It is these rules and regulations along with Hawaii Revised Statutes and County ordinances that DOCARE officers enforce.

With all law enforcement jobs, there is no "typical" day. Your day may start in the mountains checking for illegal hunting activities and finish on the shoreline enforcing marineresource violations. The area of responsibility for a DOCARE officer is vast, but his provides for an interesting and challenging work environment. Officers patrol assigned areas by foot, 4-wheel drive vehicles, boat, helicopter and other modes of transportation. DOCARE Officers have full police powers and investigate complaints and violations, issue citations, make arrests, issue warnings to educate the public and recover evidence. They also prepare reports, testify in court and provide information to the public, schools, civic groups and clubs to promote safe and responsible use of Hawai‘i’s natural resources. The presentation will also cover how the public can assist. Various examples of resources violations will be brought to the talk and made available for public viewing.
